



Occupational Therapy

Occupational Therapy (OT) supports individuals in learning the skills they need in daily life.

With children, this involves assessing their development and working with families and schools to improve their skills through play and activities.

An OT looks at a child's;

- Play skills how they develop their imaginative and social play.
- Fine motor —use of their hands and fingers.
- Gross motor—large body movements and coordination.



- Sensory—how children react to different senses in their environment such as touch, smell, sight, hearing, taste; and how this may affect their behaviour.
- Perceptual—how a child's brain interprets abstract objects; such as shapes, colours, letters and numbers. These skills are important for reading and writing.
- Self-help skills—Managing daily skills such as feeding, dressing and hygiene.
